## **Reports and Journals**

Saving the Lion Marmoset edited by D. D. Bridgwater, (American Association of Zoological Parks and Aquariums, \$5.00) presents the results of a specialists' conference. It includes papers on current taxonomic status, status in the wild and in captivity, behavioural biology and captive husbandry, as well as papers on similar rare marmoset species, a recommended captive-management programme and research priorities. Of particular value is a virtually complete unverified bibliography of the family Callithricidae from 1900 to early 1972.

An Ecological Reconnaissance of Wilpattu National Park, Ceylon, by John F. Eisenberg and Melvyn Lockhart (Smithsonian Contributions to Zoology, Number 101) is a 118-page report, based on a 14-month survey of some 580 square kilometres, and deals primarily with the wildlife biomass in relation to the ecosystem, as well as habitat utilisation. Social organisations of the ungulates are compared with their anti-predator behaviour and recommendations for park management discussed.

Vegetation of the Ngorongoro Conservation Area, Tanzania, by Dennis J. Herlocker and Herman J. Dirschl (Canadian Wildlife Service Report, No. 19, \$1.25), describes the principle physiographic units with photographic illustrations and a large fold-away vegetation map (scale 1:250,000)—an immensely useful publication about a most important area conservationwise.
