

EDITORIAL NOTE

The *Index of Names and Subjects*—the longest and most important of those which follow—is based on the indexes which have appeared with successive volumes of the *Journal*. These were the work of many different hands, and the variety of their authorship must explain any lack of uniformity in the scale of the resultant whole.

Personal names of the Roman form have in general been placed under the *gentilicium*, on the principle adopted in the *Prosopographia Imperii Romani*: but emperors and other individuals regularly known in English by some other element in their nomenclature will be found under the more familiar name. Thus Cicero and Augustus should be sought under those heads, and not under ‘Tullius’ and ‘Julius.’

The indexes of Literary Authorities, Inscriptions, Coins and Papyri are new. In them no attempt has been made to include all passages or documents mentioned in the *Journal*: their object is merely to afford a clue to those pieces of evidence about which new suggestions have been made by contributors, or on which fresh light has been thrown, whether in course of comment or by juxtaposition with other relevant material. In the *Index of Inscriptions* the more important texts of recent publication have been entered under the references by which they have come commonly to be known.

Numbers printed in **Clarendon Type** are those of volumes.
