CONTRIBUTORS

Arnaud Bartolomei, former fellow of the Casa de Velázquez (Madrid), is professor of modern history at the Université Côte d'Azur (Nice, France). He is a specialist of the history of trade in the Atlantic and Mediterranean areas. He has published various books, issues of journals or articles about the trade of Cadiz and the Carrera de Indias (Les marchands français de Cadix et la crise de la Carrera de Indias (1778-1828), 2017; "Nueva España, el último bastión del comercio imperial español en el proceso de apertura de la Carrera de Indias (1815–1825)," Illes e Imperis, 2021); and the practices of long-distance trade ("Becoming a correspondent: The foundations of new merchant relationships in early modern French trade (1730-1820)," Enterprise & Society, 2019; "The making of commercial innovations. The use of printed commercial circular letters in France and Europe (18th-19th centuries)," Business History Review, 2021). He has just completed a habilitation à diriger des recherches dedicated to the transformations of the Atlantic trade of Mexico at the time of its independence (Après l'Empire. Les reconfigurations du commerce atlantique du Mexique (vers 1750-vers 1840), 2022).

Kristian Fabian is a PhD candidate in History at the University of California, San Diego. His dissertation, "Global Conquistadors: A Social History of the Early Spanish Empire, 1480–1521," centers on the lives of sixteenth-century conquistadors who fought in multiple theaters of early Spanish expansionism: Granada, the Canary Islands, North Africa, Italy, the Caribbean, and New Spain. His dissertation has received the support of grants from several institutions, including the Fulbright-Hays (DDRA) Fellowship, the Tinker Foundation, and the Institute of Arts and Humanities at UCSD. He is advised by Professor Dana Velasco Murillo.

Max Paul Friedman is Professor of History and International Relations at American University in Washington, DC. He is the author of the prizewinning book Nazis and Good Neighbors: The United States Campaign against the Germans of Latin America in World War II (2003) and Rethinking Anti-Americanism: The History of an Exceptional Concept in American Foreign Relations (2012). He is co-editor of Partisan Histories: The Past in Contemporary Global Politics (Palgrave Macmillan, 2005) and The Cambridge History of America and the World, Volume 4: Since 1945 (Cambridge University Press, 2022). A fellow of the Guggenheim Foundation, Fulbright Commission, and Woodrow Wilson Foundation, and an American University Scholar/Teacher of the Year, he received the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation's Friedrich Wilhelm Bessel Award for scholarly excellence.

Travis Knoll received his PhD in History with a focus on Latin America from Duke University in 2022 and is currently a history instructor at Wingate University in North Carolina. His research examines the links between Catholicism, political and legal philosophy, and social movements, focusing on racial justice policy and religious civil society organizations in the formation of international progressive organizations. He has also managed interdisciplinary and vertically integrated public policy project teams focusing on social mobility, religion, public policy, and access to higher education in Brazil. His publications for a broad audience include pieces for the *Washington Post*, *Huffington Post*, *Global Americans*, and *The Conversation*.

Rodrigo Veliz is a Guatemalan historian and a Fellow in Latin American History at the University of Leeds. In collaboration with Emeterio Toj Medrano, he wrote a biography *Cuando el indio tomó las armas. La biografía de Emeterio Toj Medrano* (2021 and 2022). He has a manuscript pending publication at UNAM: "Triunfo electoral y derrota política. El general Efraín Ríos Montt y la derrota estratégica de la Democracia Cristiana guatemalteca (1964–1974)."
