ROBIN HOLLOWAY was born in Learnington Spa in 1943. A chorister at St. Paul's Cathedral from 1952 to 1957 (a period which also saw his first attempts at composition) he studied privately with Alexander Goehr from 1959 to 1963 and read Music at King's College, Cambridge. In 1969 he became a Research Fellow at Gonville and Caius College, and he has been an assistant lecturer in the Music Faculty of Cambridge University since 1974. In addition to his compositions, he has been a prolific writer on music: his book *Debussy and Wagner* will be published by Eulenberg this autumn, and his review, in this issue of TEMPO, of the première of Berg's complete *Lulu* is the complement to much larger study in the current number of the *Cambridge Review*. He is at present working on a Horn Concerto for Barry Tuckwell.

BAYAN NORTHCOTT is Music Critic of the Sunday Telegraph and editor of a symposium upon the music of Alexander Goehr to be published this autumn by Schott. He has recently completed a Sonata for solo oboe and is now composing some Japanese lyrics,

DERRICK PUFFETT teaches at Wolfson College, Oxford. He is a frequent contributor to musical periodicals, concentrating especially on composers in the Austro-German tradition at work before the turn of the century.
