NSF Programs Guide

The National Science Foundation has published its Guide to Programs for 1975.

The *Guide* describes 64 NSF programs in the areas of scientific research projects, national and special research programs, research applications, national research centers, international cooperative scientific activities, science education, and special programs. The new volume includes an updated NSF organizational chart and a statement on the criteria for the selection of research projects.

American University LONDON Seminar

The American University has inaugurated a Semester in London Program beginning in September 1975. The Program is designed for college juniors and seniors who wish an opportunity to learn about British institutions in Britain from British experts while benefiting from the chance to live with a British family. The Semester in London Program is planned for the fall semester each academic year and for the fall 1975 program will offer courses in British Politics and Society; Topics in British Culture and Independent Study or Research Projects. Comparative POLICY Studies

The Comparative Public Policy Group of the Committee on Political Sociology is carrying forward an active program of meetings and publications, to develop and apply concepts central in the empirical analysis of public policy. The Committee is a research body of the International Political Science Association and the International Sociological Association.

A conference on the Dynamics of Public Policy analyzed a central concern of the social sciences by examining how policies change (or fail to change) through time at a meeting of political scientists at Cumberland Lodge, Windsor Great Park, England, May 6-10, 1974. Papers were presented by: Herman J. Aquina, University of Mijmegen; Michael Bassand, University of Geneva; Jack A. Brand, University of Strathclyde; Hugh Heclo, The Brookings Institution; Arnold J. A selection of papers, with an Introduction by Richard Rose, University of Strathclyde, and a conclusion by Hugh Heclo, of the Brookings Institution, is now being prepared for book publication.

An interdisciplinary conference on public policy in Eastern and Western Europe was sponsored by the Committee, in collaboration with the Polish Academy of Sciences, at Jablonna Palace Warsaw, May 14-19, 1974. The papers will appear in a volume of the Polish Academy of Sciences, under the editorship of Jerzy Wiatr and Richard Rose.

Forthcoming activities of the Committee include an International Roundtable on the Market for Policy Research, Vienna, September 29-October 3, 1975. The Roundtable will examine the supply, demand and utilization by government of policy relevant research. Participants will represent a variety of backgrounds in universities, social science institutes and government agencies. The involvement of experts from Austria, Britain, Germany and the United States will also permit a systematic consideration of the extent to which policy research differs in varying national contexts.

The Committee plans to sponsor a 'report session' at the 1976 IPSA Congress in Edinburgh, August 15-21, 1976, at which political scientists from many different countries will be invited to make a short presentation describing current policy research. Professor Arnold J. Heidenheimer, Political Science, Washington University, St. Louis, Missouri 63130, will organize in collaboration with the Committee, a major program session, "New Directions in Comparative Policy Studies."

POLITICAL SCIENCE: THE DISCIPLINE has been selected as the theme of the 1976 issue in the POLITICS series, published by the Department of Political Science at East Carolina University. SCHOLAR-DIPLOMAT Seminars

The Scholar-Diplomat Seminar Program will begin its sixth year of successful operation this fall. Under the program, university faculty members spend a week in the State Department observing at firsthand the foreign policy process. The Seminars bring together scholars, particularly younger Ph.D.'s, and Government officers involved in making and executing foreign policy. More than 1000 scholars have participated in the program since its inception in 1969. One indication of the program's effectiveness is the fact that most new applications are received from scholars who have heard about the program from previous attendees.

The seminars are kept small—under 20—and the key element of the program is that each participant is assigned to the Bureau of his (or her) particular area of interest. During the week the scholar works with a Bureau host officer, views the host officer's work, discusses policy papers, and contributes knowledge and ideas. In-depth sessions are arranged with the major organizational units of the Department, both geographic and functional. Similar sessions are also arranged with other agencies of the Government involved with the foreign policy process. BICENTENNIAL Youth Debates

Bicentennial Youth Debates (BYD), a nationwide program organized on a local level which provides young people the opportunity to explore critical humanistic issues through Lincoln-Douglas Debate, Extemporaneous Speaking and Persuasive Speaking programs, operates on two contest levels: high school and college age (any individual under 25 years of age who has not received a B.A. or its equivalent is eligible). Winners at the local level will proceed through District, Sectional, and Regional events to a final National conference in Washington, D.C. An award program for outstanding participants is planned.

BYD is supported by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities and is a project of the Speech Communication Association.

BYD also operates on a community level, in which BYD participants may present programs before civic, professional, and educational organizations, or may more actively involve the membership in a dialogue about the issues. Topics are drawn from the calendar of issues of the American Issues Forum and cover a broad range of concerns from forms of governance, appropriate roles of the respective branches of government, and individual rights, to regulating the economy, the organization of labor, and the role of the family in American life.


