## THE CONTRIBUTORS

Jan Szczepański is Professor of Sociology at the University of Łódź and Vice-Chairman of the Institute of Philosophy and Sociology at the Polish Academy of Sciences. During 1960-1961, he was a Fellow at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences in Stanford, Calif. His publications include Wykształcenie a pozycja społeczna inteligencji (The Education and Social Position of the Intelligentsia) (2 vols., Łódź, 1959-1960).

- T. C. Schelling is Professor of Economics at Harvard University and a faculty member of Harvard's Center for International Affairs. The author of *The Strategy of Conflict* (1960) and, with Morton H. Halperin, of *Strategy and Arms Control* (1961), he is currently working in the fields of military strategy, arms control, and theory of bargaining.
- S. F. GIFFIN, a retired brigadier general of the United States Air Force, is an analyst with the Institute for Defense Analyses in Washington, D.C., who is presently engaged in a study of implications in the emergence of Communist China as a nuclear power.

PHYLLIS J. ROLNICK, a member of the Department of Government at Cornell University, is working on a study of the relation of political ideology to social change in India. In 1959-1960 she engaged in research in India as a Ford Foundation Fellow.

CLEMENT HENRY MOORE, a Harvard University graduate student and the holder of a Ford Foundation fellowship, has been doing research in Tunisia during the past two years and will return to Harvard in September as a teaching fellow. Andrew C. Janos, Research Associate of the Center of International Studies at Princeton, is engaged in research on social change in Hungary and on general problems of political violence and internal war.

HAROLD GUETZKOW is Professor of Political Science at Northwestern University, with joint appointments in Psychology and Sociology, as well as Co-director of Northwestern's Program of Graduate Training and Research in International Relations, with Richard C. Snyder. His work on *Use of Simulation for the Study of Internation Relations* will appear later this year.

IMANUEL WEXLER, Assistant Professor of Economics at the University of Connecticut, in Storrs, Conn., is preparing a book on the World Bank.
