16th Canadian Congress of Neurological Sciences

Approximately 250 delegates from across Canada attended the 16th Canadian Congress of Neurological Sciences held in Calgary June 24-27, 1981. Pre-congress courses, which have become an increasingly popular component of this meeting, were organized on the first day of the Congress. This year's courses focused on the topics "Neuroendocrinology", "Electroencephalography", and "Anatomical Basis of Contemporary Neurosurgery". A one day meeting of the Canadian Association for Child Neurology was also held in conjunction with the Congress.

Special guests at the 1981 Congress included Professor Gazi Yasargil from Zurich who delivered the Penfield lecture, Professor John Desmedt from Brussels who presented the Canadian Neurological Society guest lecture, and Professor Douglas Miller from Edinburgh, the Royal College lecturer.

Social events included an Alberta Heritage Night at the University of Calgary Faculty of Medicine, a barbecue and rodeo at a ranch in the Foothills west of Calgary, and the annual boat races (rafting on the Bow River). Much to their embarrassment, teams representing neurology, neurosurgery, and clinical neurophysiology were decisively beaten by a team of neurological-neurosurgical nurses.

The final day of the Congress consisted of a Symposium entitled "Future Directions for Research in the Clinical Neurosciences: Policies, Strategy, and Funding". Participants included Drs. Albert Aguayo, Donald Tower, Louis Poirier, Michael Graham, Patrick McGeer, Keith Cooper, Joseph Martin, John Desmedt, and the Chairman, Dr. Robert Lee. It is planned to publish a summary of the discussions which took place at this Symposium in a future issue of the Journal.

Association of Canadian Neuroscientists On June 17, 1981, during the annual meeting of the Canadian Federation of Biological Sciences in Montreal a group of Canadian neuroscientists met to officially form a new organization — the Association of Canadian Neuroscientists. Until now basic neuroscientists in Canada have been affiliated with a number of regional chapters of the Society for Neuroscience. These chapters will continue to function, but it was felt that there was a need for a new organization to promote better communication between both basic and clinical neuroscientists across Canada, to represent the interests of the neuroscience community in Canada, and to provide a unified voice for Canadian neuroscience.

The officers elected at the Montreal meeting are: President - Dr. Vivian Abrahams, Kingston, Vice-President - Dr. Albert Aguayo, Montreal, Secretary - Dr. Robert Dykes, Montreal, Treasurer - Dr. Anthony Phillips, Vancouver.

The next business meeting of the Association will be held during the annual meeting of the Society for Neuroscience in Los Angeles, October 18-23, 1981. Alzheimer Society

At the recent annual meeting of the Alzheimer Society, Arthur J. Dalton, Ph.D. was elected President. Dr. Dalton, a psychologist, is director of the behavior research program, Surrey Place Centre, Toronto.

Recognizing the fact that an estimated 60,000 in Canada are afflicted by Alzheimer's disease, with about 9,000 fatalities per year, the Alzheimer Society was established in 1978 with a federal charter to provide support to families of sufferers, to promote education on Alzheimer's disease, and to stimulate and coordinate research efforts. The Society has grown to 950 members, and chapters exist in 19

cities in 8 provinces across Canada. A major fund-raising drive will be launched this fall.
