Founded in 1972, *Nationalities Papers* is the leading journal on the dynamics of nationalism and ethnicity across the Balkans, Central Europe, and the former Soviet Union. Our scope ranges from the great 19th century empires (Hapsburg, Ottoman and Russian) to the resurgence of nationalism since the collapse of communism in 1989–91. Our coverage also includes adjacent countries such as Afghanistan and Turkey. Combining country-level expertise with theoretical sophistication and methodological rigor, we welcome articles based on archival research or fieldwork, and that engage with key analytical debates.

An important aspect of the journal is to bring together the work of scholars from a variety of disciplines, including anthropology, history, political science and sociology. The journal also publishes book reviews, review essays, symposia on important books in the field, and articles on breaking current events. Under an arrangement with Routledge, special issues of the journal may be published as self-standing books.

Nationalities Papers is the official journal of the Association for the Study of Nationalities, whose annual conference at Columbia University is the largest international gathering of scholars of nationalism. Many of the journal's articles originate in panels at the conference. The journal is able to tap the international membership of ASN, with their expert knowledge of the region, to review submitted manuscripts.

Electronic Submission. All submissions should be made online at the *Nationalities Papers* ScholarOne Manuscripts site (http://mc.manuscriptcentral.com/CNAP). New users should first create an account. Once a user is logged onto the site submissions should be made via the Author Centre. Authors should prepare and upload two versions of their manuscript. One should be a complete text, while in the second all document information identifying the author should be removed from files to allow them to be sent anonymously to referees. When uploading files authors will then be able to define the non-anonymous version as "File not for review".

Note to authors. Authors should be mindful of the need to identify and reference quoted material – text, tables, and figures – clearly and consistently, and to secure written permission from the copyright holder as appropriate. http://tandf.tandf.co.uk/journals/ethics.asp
