seem to neglect advances made in Great Britain and America. Killian's work on endoscopy, submucous resection of the septum, choanal polypus and suspension laryngoscopy were at once accepted by Anglo-Saxon specialists. The advances made by the Vienna school in regard to the functional examination of the vestibular apparatus and operations for labyrinthitis were rapidly made known both in Britain and America. It would appear, however, that advances made in countries other than Germany and Austria are very slow indeed of recognition by Teutonic specialists. We may instance Marriage's immediate skin grafting after the radical mastoid operation and enucleation of the tonsils by the Whillis-Sluder method. J. S. FRASER.

#### THE LATE DR NOEL STUART WHITTON, CHRISTCHURCH, N.Z.

We regret to record the death, at the early age of 35, of Dr Noel Whitton, Assistant-Surgeon in the Ear and Throat Department, Christchurch Hospital, New Zealand. After the War in which he served in the R.A.M.C. in France, Mesopotamia, and Palestine, and gaining the M.C., Dr Whitton decided to specialise in diseases of the ear and throat. #### INTER-STATE POST-GRADUATE ASSEMBLY OF AMERICA.

The Inter-State Post-Graduate Assembly, the membership of which includes Canadians, is the largest post-graduate body in America. Paris will be included in the itinerary. Mr Philip Franklin, F.R.C.S., is responsible for the organisation of the visit to the British Isles, and in Manchester the special arrangements are in the hands of Sir William Milligan.




