In May 1985, the King's Fund Centre and the Wellcome Institute for the History of Medicine sponsored a symposium concerned with hospital clinical records. A

number of short papers set out problems associated with their legal status, bulk, methods of keeping them, and actual and potential uses, as well as issues associated with confidentiality. As a result of the meeting, a Working Party under the chairmanship of Dr Stephen Lock, Editor of the British Medical Journal, has been set up to examine these problems more fully. A survey is also being conducted by the Public Record Office and the Contemporary Medical Archives Centre of the Wellcome Institute to determine the extent to which clinical records have survived. In the meantime, the Proceedings of the Symposium are available from the King's Fund Centre, 126 Albert Street, London NW1 7NF, for £1.00. This booklet makes fascinating reading and should be of interest to medical practitioners and historians, as well as to record officers and hospital administrators.

NEW PUBLICATION

The Historical Collections of the Library of the College of Physicians of Philadelphia announces the publication, in February 1986, of the first issue of Fugitive Leaves from the Historical Collections. Originally published as Fugitive Leaves from the Library 1935-69, the newsletter was published by Walton B.
