### 'The Tragedy of Wanit': A Japanese Account of Wartime Thai Politics

By Benjamin A. Batson (Senior Lecturer, Department of History, National University of Singapore) and Shimizu Hajime (Senior Researcher, Area Studies Department, Institute of Developing Economies, Tokyo, Japan)

The Tragedy of Wanit' is a memoir of Thai politics at the outbreak of the Pacific War, written in the 1950s by Asada Shunsuke, a senior Japanese diplomat serving in Bangkok during the critical pre-war period. The central figure is Wanit Pananon, a confidant of Thai Prime Minister Phibun and, until his arrest and death in mysterious circumstances in early 1944, a key figure in Thai-Japanese relations. Asada's memoir is published both in Japanese and in an edited English translation, together with an introduction by Benjamin A. Batson and Shimizu Hajime which explains the historical context and discusses some of the implications of Asada's work.

## A Vietnamese Scholar in Anguish: Nguyễn Khuyến and the Decline of the Confucian Order, 1884-1909

Nguyễn Khuyến was a senior Mandarin in Vietnam when the French established colonial control over the country. Around 1884 he withdrew from public life, returning to his ancestral village where he worked as a farmer and wrote trenchant poetry commenting on social life in Vietnam. This literary work reflects his feeling of anguish as he watched the decline of traditional mores, and it provides poignant insights into Vietnamese life during this period of change. The text provides translations of a number of Nguyễn Khuyến's poems, and appendices reproduce his work both in the Romanized Vietnamese script and in Chinese.



Before a manuscript can be published, it must conform to the Journal's style sheet which is available upon request. Submission of an article will be taken to mean that it has not been previously published and that it is not on offer to any other publisher. Contributors are encouraged to submit articles using electronic mail, or to submit hard copy computer printouts, whenever possible. Authors receive a complimentary copy of the issue of the Journal in which their piece appears, and 30 offprints.

Material appearing in the *Journal of Southeast Asian Studies* does not necessarily represent the views of the Editors or the publisher, and responsibility for opinions expressed and the accuracy of facts published in articles rests solely with the individual authors.
