


The journal uses Windows-based PCs exclusively. The work should be formatted in 12-point type and double-spaced throughout, including quotations, notes, and bibliography. Please allow generous margins of an inch or more for editorial corrections. Authors of essays accepted for publication must secure and submit permissions to reproduce photographs or other illustrations and tables.
