La Syphilis Auriculaire. (Oreille et Nerf Acoustique). J. RAMADIER, Oto-Rhino Laryngologist to the Hospitals of Paris. (Gaston Doin et Cie., Paris 1928. Price 15 francs.)

The author of this small book of the Practical Medicine Series has aimed at bringing the subject of Syphilis of the ear up to date, and of interesting not only the specialist by his description of the various syphilitic otopathies, but also the general practitioner by showing how the auricular manifestation may be the first evidence of an endocranial nerve syphilis.

After dealing with the historical side of the subject he gives a detailed study of the various and numerous lesions of auricular syphilis that occur in the different forms of the disease, namely in primary, secondary and tertiary acquired syphilis, in tabes, and in early and late hereditary syphilis. The etiology, symptomatology, pathological anatomy, prognosis and effects of treatment, and diagnosis are discussed in each stage, and finally owing to our present lack of knowledge on the anatomico-pathological side the question of treatment is based upon a topographical and clinical classification of the various lesions, viz., cutaneo-mucous, bony and nervous. The whole subject forms a very clear and comprehensive study of our present knowledge of auricular syphilis.

#### THE LATE DR DAVID ALEXANDER THOMSON.

We regret to record the death of Dr David Alexander Thomson, M.B., Ch.B., D.L.O., which took place on the 11th July. Dr Thomson, who was a graduate both in Arts and Medicine, had a distinguished career as a student at the University of Glasgow, where in 1907 he took his medical degree with Honours.

With a view to acquiring a knowledge of diseases of the ear and throat, Dr Thomson was appointed clinical assistant to the Ear and Throat Department at Guy's Hospital, where he worked for a considerable period of time.

Dr Thomson settled in Blackpool. He became Aural Surgeon and Laryngologist to the Fleetwood Hospital. A Fellow of the Royal Society of Medicine, he attended the meetings of the Sections of Laryngology and Otology.

#### THE LATE DR OSCAR BECK, VIENNA.

By the death of Oscar Beck, the specialty has lost the services of one of its most earnest workers. As Privat-Dozent in the clinic of Professor Neumann, he was looked upon by both colleagues and pupils as the man who would in course of time occupy the chief position in the clinic. His brilliant work upon syphilis and tuberculosis of the ear had marked him out as an able and accurate observer and as one who had added to our knowledge of diseases of the ear.

Beck possessed great skill as an operator. He was a very successful and popular teacher in the Post-graduate Courses; speaking excellent English, courteous in manner, and sparing no pains in the elucidation of difficult problems, he will be greatly missed among the English-speaking graduates attending the Vienna school.

We have to record the death of Professor Dr F. Siebenmann of Bâle, the distinguished Swiss ôto-laryngologist.

# Models of the Labyrinth



These models (King's College Hospital pattern) were devised by

Mr A. H. CHEATLE and Mr NEGUS for teaching purposes and for investigating

labyrinthine diseases.

The pointers on the Head frame lie parallel with the Frankfort plane, so that when the frame is on the head the models lie in correct orientation in all respects. The patient's head can be put in any position and the exact relations of each of the canals are seen; rotation and caloric tests can be carried out with the frame in position.
