



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4th Nationalities Papers Photo Contest







Our annual photo contest rewards scholars for the best photos from their fieldwork. These photos are judged in terms of their content, synthesis, and visually compelling insights about nationalism, ethnicity, or migration. The photo submissions should be accompanied by a brief description (300-500 words) of how the photo relates to the fieldwork of the applicant in particular and nationalism, ethnicity or migration in general. This is the third year of the photo contest!

The contest is judged by a jury comprised of scholars from the editorial board of the journal and past awardees. The membership of the jury changes every year, and is led by the editor-in-chief and supported by the managing editor. The 6 prize-winning photographs will be featured on the cover of *Nationalities Papers*. The photographer will be acknowledged in *Nationalities Papers*.

Photo taken by Ana Milošević: "A memory landfill – the abandoned memorial complex 'Bosko Buha,' on the border between Serbia and Montenegro. Built in the 1960s to commemorate both female and male combatants who fought for the liberation of Yugoslavia from Nazi-Fascist control, the memorial complex thrived in visitors until the 1990s, when it was abandoned. In the 1990s it also accommodated monuments for those killed by communist forces (e.g., the 'monument for the victims of communists in peace times and in the war'). The photograph illustrates how memories that do not support contemporary political objectives are discarded and disregarded. Across the Western Balkans, the attempt to completely erase transnational Yugoslav memories has often left space solely for ethno-nationalist histories. As a result of this ethno-nationalization of memory, once glorified transnational heroes now reside on a landfill of memory. Photo taken in Jabuka, Serbia, August, 2017."

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
