THE CONTRIBUTORS

EDWARD H. BUEHRIG, University Professor of Government at Indiana University, is the author of *Woodrow Wilson and the Balance of Power* (1955) and is currently making a study of the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestinian Refugees as an example of an international operational undertaking.

SAMUEL P. HUNTINGTON is Professor of Government and a Faculty Member of the Center for International Affairs at Harvard. He has written *The Soldier and the State* (1957) and *The Common Defense* (1961), and is co-author, with Zbigniew Brzezinski, of *Political Power: USA/USSR* (1964).

S. N. AFRIAT, a former member of the Research Staff of the Department of Applied Economics at Cambridge University and a Research Associate in Economics at Princeton, has taught economics and mathematics at Rice University since 1962. Next fall he will become Professor of Economics in the Graduate School of Industrial Administration at Purdue University. He is engaged in a work on theory of the consumer supported by the National Science Foundation.

LELAND L. JOHNSON has served as a research economist with The RAND Corporation since 1957 and is presently doing research on economic development and the U.S. foreign assistance program in Latin America.

ELLEN FREY-WOUTERS is Assistant Professor of Political Science at Brooklyn College of the City University of New York. She is preparing a book on the theory of regional integration.

RICHARD S. MILLER is Professor of Law at Wayne State University Law School in Detroit. Most of his publications have been in the area of civil procedure and he is now working on an article dealing with limitations on the intelligence-gathering functions of administration agencies and one treating the effects of the Cold War.

LEON GORDENKER, Associate Professor of Politics and Faculty Associate of the Center of International Studies at Princeton, is completing a study of the United Nations Secretary-General and the maintenance of peace. His publications include *The United Nations and the Peaceful Unification of Korea* (1959).

LORAND DABASI-SCHWENG was formerly on the faculty of the Palatine Joseph University in Budapest and a staff member of the Economic Research Department of the Hungarian National Bank. Since 1951 he has specialized in international consulting, especially as it concerns agricultural development, in the Near and Middle East and in Central and South America. He has a position at present as an agricultural economist in Lahore, Pakistan.

MANCUR OLSON, JR., Assistant Professor of Economics and Faculty Associate of the Center of International Studies at Princeton, is author of *The Economics of the Wartime Shortage: A History of British Food Shortages in the Napoleonic War and World Wars I and II* (1963) and *The Logic of Collective Action: Public Goods and the Theory of Groups*, to appear later this year. He is now writing a book on economic development in historical perspective.
