REPORT OF THE SECOND ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE FAUNA PRESERVATION SOCIETY, held at the Offices of the Zoological Society of London on Wednesday, 1st April, 1953.

The Marquess of Willingdon, President, in the Chair. About eighty members present.

- (1) The Minutes of the First Annual Meeting were read, confirmed, and signed by the Chairman.
- (2) The Auditors' Report and the Council's Annual Report for the year ending 31st December, 1952, were approved and adopted.
- (3) The Officers of the Society for the ensuing year were unanimously elected.

(5) Dr. P. G. Van Tienhoven was unanimously elected a Vice-President of the Society.

The Marquess of Willingdon, after expressing his gratitude to the Society for re-electing him President, thanked the Honorary Treasurer, the Secretary, and the Assistant Secretary for their work during the past year.

He pointed out that the excess of income over expenditure was due to a few most generous donations. These could not be

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expected to be a permanent feature of the accounts; nevertheless they would make it possible to expend more on the preservation of wild life, which was the sole object of the Society's existence.

Immediately after the meeting Miss Frances Pitt gave a lecture entitled "A Naturalist in Norway", illustrated by her own films.

General Meeting.—A General Meeting was held on 24th February, 1953. Mr. H. F. E. Elliot gave a lecture entitled "The Wild Life of Tristan da Cunha", accompanied by his own film.
