Mann, University of Pennsylvania Law School, 3400 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania 19104. The text should be typed, double-spaced, on 8½" x 11" paper with ample margins on all sides. Type on one side of the paper only. Footnotes should be typed double-spaced and separate from the text, and should conform to either the style found in the Chicago Manual of Style (13th ed.) or to A Uniform System of Citation (14th ed.); the Chicago Manual is preferred. Authors of accepted manuscripts should contact the editorial office regarding computer compatibility. Because of the commitment we ask of our outside referees, Law and History Review cannot consider for publication manuscripts that have been submitted to other journals. A submission to the Review carries with it the implicit promise that the author will not submit the manuscript elsewhere while it is under consideration by Law and History Review.
