Geoffrey Poole has recently conducted the première of his concerto Two-Way Talking for African drummer and five ensembles in Manchester, and is fulfilling a commission The Magnification of the Virgin for the Taverner Choir and the Birmingham Contemporary Music Group, scheduled for performance on 9 February 1991. He is a senior lecturer in Music at Manchester University.
