Israel is divided into three longitudinal belts: the coastal plain, the mountainous backbone and the Jordan-Arava Rift Valley which runs through the country from north to south. Different erosional and depositional processes prevail in each of these belts, responding in various ways to common causes such as climate and sea levels.
