SPRING-SUMMER SPECIAL ISSUE

The next two numbers of the Business History Review will be combined in a special issue devoted to the interaction of fashion, business, and business organization. Illustrated articles will consider a variety of topics — the influence on the Japanese wool industry of the introduction of European clothing into Japan; the disruptive effect on Russian planning of a reintroduction of fashion; the influence of fashion on the development of the Scottish damask industry; the relation between sumptuary laws and fashion in seventeenth and eighteenth century Europe; the extent to which fashion tends to impede industrial organization — and will be synthesized by a general interpretive essay on the relations between fashion and business.

The special Fashion Issue will also contain the regular features of the *Business History Review* such as the Editors' Corner and the Book Review section.

The Harvard Graduate School of Business Administration announces the availability of funds to aid archivists, librarians, and researchers interested in investigating topics in economic and business history or in studying the acquisition and handling of archival material, manuscripts, and books in these fields. The School's unique resources in these areas will be available to such persons during the summer of 1963. Members of the Business History Group and the staff of Baker Library will be available for consultation and guidance, but applicants who receive assistance will be free to pursue their projects as they think best.
