principles of stemmatics (Blok 232) and must have known something of the history of the excerpts, should have proved himself here no better than a Havercamp (cf. Munro's ed. of Lucretius, i<sup>4</sup>. 18). In the present state of our ignorance, and since Heinsius was Heinsius and not Havercamp, I have, wisely or unwisely, cited the excerpts fairly freely in my apparatus as if they possessed independent authority.
