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
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


JOHN HURT FISHER (16 Oct. 1919-17 Feb. 2015). Born in Lexington, Kentucky, to missionary parents, John Fisher spent his first birthday in Bombay, India, and soon thereafter traveled by train and later horse and wagon to Hamadan, Persia (now Iran), the ancient summer capital of Darius and Xerxes, where he lived for fourteen years. He grew up speaking three languages—Assyrian, Farsi, and English—which augured well for a scholarly career as a linguist and for professional administrative service to the Modern Language Association. He returned to the United States alone, received his AB degree in 1940 from Maryville College, in Tennessee, and the AM (1942) and PhD (1945) from the University of Pennsylvania. His first academic appointment was at New York University, and in 1948 he was asked to help organize that year's MLA meeting, the first since 1942. The next year, the university gave him a course off, and he was appointed assistant secretary of the MLA; in 1952 he additionally was made treasurer. Leaving New York in 1955, he taught for five years at Duke University, followed by two at Indiana University. He then returned to the MLA to assume the executive secretaryship in 1963 and the editorship of *PMLA* in 1964, with a continuing appointment at NYU. He and his predecessor Win Stone were among the founders of the Association of Departments of English, an independent body supported by the MLA that set up seminars for incoming chairs of departments and established and published the MLA Job Vacancy List. Shortly thereafter, in 1969, came the Association of Departments of Foreign Languages. During his tenure, MLA membership grew from about fourteen thousand to thirty thousand, the ADE and ADFL bulletins were begun, the Center for Editions of American Authors became one of the first projects funded by the newly established National Endowment for the Humanities, and the MLA Bibliography was computerized and grew to more than forty thousand items. John's term as executive secretary ended in 1971, and after two more years at NYU he went to the University of Tennessee as John C. Hodges Professor, where he remained until he retired in 1988, having served as head of the Department of English during 1976–78. He was elected president of the MLA in 1974.

But the MLA was only a part of John's distinguished career. He cofounded the New Chaucer Society in 1974 and served as its bibliographer (1974–77), president (1982), and executive director (1982–89). He was elected a fellow of the Medieval Academy of America in 1983, president of the academy in 1987, and president of the fellows for 1993–96. He wrote or edited a dozen books on major medieval writers, chiefly Gower and Chaucer, and seminal studies on the emergence of standard English. A testament to the enduring quality of his work is the fact that 2012, twenty-four years after his retirement, saw the appearance of the third edition of his *The Complete Poetry and Prose of Geoffrey Chaucer* and of his and Mark Allen's *The Variorum Edition of the Wife of Bath's Prologue and Tale.* For his administrative and his scholarly contributions, students and teachers of English and foreign languages will be long in his debt.

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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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



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




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
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
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
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


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


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
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
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
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
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


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
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
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
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
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
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


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
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
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
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
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


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
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
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
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


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
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
