- Original research articles should be between 6,000 and 8,000 words, including tables and figures, with an accompanying abstract not exceeding 200 words. Contributors should note the journal's editorial policy, which is stated within the inside front cover.
- 3. Guest editorials will be invited pieces in which authors will provide a short, analytical commentary on a topical issue. The recommended length for guest editorials is 2,000 words. Some issues of the journal may also contain review articles (5,000 words) and debate essays (3,000 words). Review articles will feature a discussion of two or three books on a related theme while debate articles will assess an area within the scholarly disciplines or policies pertinent to health. - 4. Submission of an article is taken to imply that it has not been previously published and is not being considered for

- publication elsewhere. Authors of articles published in the journal assign copyright to Cambridge University Press (with certain rights reserved) and you will receive a copyright assignment form for signature on acceptance of your paper.
- 5. All articles should be written in English (authors are responsible for any language editing required) and should follow the style sheet which contains detailed information on referencing, footnotes, spelling etc. The full style sheet may be found at: journals.cambridge.org/hep or obtained from the Editorial Assistant (hepl@lse.ac.uk).
- First proofs may be read and corrected by contributors provided they can return the corrected proofs within two days of receiving them.
- Health Economics, Policy and Law endorses the International Committee of Medical Journal Editors' Uniform Requirements for Manuscripts Submitted to Biomedical Journals. Authors should familiarise themselves with the Uniform Requirements at www.ICMJE.org before submitting their manuscripts.
- Authors of accepted articles will be supplied with two complimentary copies of the printed issue in which their contribution is published. Each contributor shall on request also be provided with a copy of the PDF version of their article to create printed offprints.
