The Fifth International Congress of Economic History will be held August 10-14 in Leningrad. All travel arrangements in Russia, including visas, must be handled through Intourist. Certain selected travel agencies can provide visas.

Special flights are being arranged from Paris to Leningrad by Monsieur H. Furet, École des Hautes, 54 Rue de Varennes, Paris. The rates are as follows for 6 days, hotel, daily trip to Congress, two meals, and air flight:

There is also an arrangement for 15 days to include the International History meeting in Moscow. Rates are \$383, \$454, \$298, and \$367.

Group flights to Leningrad or Paris can be arranged, provided we have at least 50 passengers. The rate would be approximately \$400 to Leningrad and return, and \$275 New York to Paris and return.
