New Head, Division of Neurology, University of Toronto

Dr. J.A. Sharpe was appointed Head of the Division of Neurology, University of Toronto, in November 1989. The previous incumbent, Dr. J.R. Wherret, has just returned from a sabbatical in the Netherlands and will rejoin the Division as an active member of the Neurology Staff. Dr. Sharpe will continue both his research activities in oculomotor and vestibular physiology at The Toronto Hospital, and his duties as Head of Neurology at the Toronto Hospital.

New Head, Division of Clinical Neurological Sciences, University of Western Ontario, London, Ontario

Dr. V.C. Hachinski became the Richard and Beryl Ivey Professor and Chairman of the Department of Clinical Neurological Sciences, University of Western Ontario, in February 1990, taking over from Dr. John Girvin. Dr. Hachinski joined the Department in January, 1980, having previously been in the Faculty of Medicine, Division of Neurology, University of Toronto, until 1980.

Diagnosis of poliomyelitis in Canada

Dr. Anne Carter, Secretary, National Advisory Committee on Immunization, Health and Welfare Canada, wants to encourage physicians to exert a higher degree of suspicion of the possibility of polio in Canada. Since November, 1987, there have been six cases in Canada, five being vaccine associated and one wild. If the potential diagnosis is not entertained early, appropriate diagnostic work-up and treatment is delayed. The major differential is Guillain Barre polyneuropathy.

Canadian leads team in brain study

Dr. Harold Robertson, a pharmacologist at Dalhousie University, heads a Canadian team of seven scientists in an international project involving the USA, Japan and Britain. The \$25 million project is to investigate the role of dopamine in Parkinson's, Huntington's dissease and schizophrenia.

New Chairman, American College of Physicians

Dt. Thomas J. Murray became Chairman of the American College of Physicians' Board of Governers at the 71st Annual Session in Chicago, April, 1990. The ACP is the largest medical-specialty society in North America, consisting of 67,000 members. Dr. Murray is at present Dean and Professor of Medicine at Dalhousie University, and was past president of the Canadian Congress of Neurological Sciences.
