

CONTRIBUTORS TO THIS ISSUE

Lawrence F. Barmann, S.J., is a candidate for the Ph.D. degree at Cambridge University. He is the author of Newman at St. Mary's: A Selection of the Parochial and Plain Sermons, of Newman's Reflections on God and Self, and of a number of articles.

H. T. Dickinson, Assistant Lecturer in History at Edinburgh University, is the editor of *The Correspondence of Sir James Clavering (1708-40)*, *Publications of the Surtees Society*. He has published articles on eighteenth-century party politics and from 1964-66 was Earl Grey Fellow at the University of Newcastle upon Tyne.

Abraham D. Kriegel is Assistant Professor of History at Memphis State University. He has recently done research in England and Ireland on a grant from the American Philosophical Society and is now preparing a book on the Whigs and Ireland in the 1830s.

Roy M. MacLeod, who has recently moved from the University of Sussex to be Fellow of Churchill College, Cambridge, has published articles concerned with nineteenth-century medicine.

William Tordoff, Professor of Political Science at the University of Zambia, is the author of Ashanti under the Prempehs, 1888-1935 and of Government and Politics in Tanzania. He has presented papers at recent conferences in social science.

Ralph V. Turner, who is Associate Professor of History at Ohio University, has published articles on medieval English courts.

Wayne Warncke is Associate Professor of English at Hartwick College. He has published articles and is engaged in research on various aspects of English literature in the modern period.

George Yule, Professor of Church History at Ormond College, University of Melbourne, is the author of *The Independents in the English Civil War*. He has published a number of articles on Puritanism and has recently been on a Nuffield Research Grant in England to pursue his work in the same area.
