is now the most prodigious calendar calculating savant alive since the death of Kim Peek (who inspired the 'Rain Man'). He writes:

'To count in a dream: listen to the rythem [sic] inside, see every "1" as a Sunday, every "2" as a Monday, "3" equals Tuesday, "4" equals Wednesday, "5" equals Thursday, "6" equals Friday, "7" equals Saturday; then the months will come to you as you go through a century; to get to the new dream, you must start over, you must RESET the days. . . . '
