Law-Making in Australia

Edited by Alice Erh-Soon Tay and Eugene Kamenka

There is today an increasingly widespread recognition of major and even fundamental changes in the nature and function of laws and legal institutions in modern society. New attitudes, new conditions and new demands press on the lawyer, the law-maker and the law-teacher from all sides. The demands for change, reform or even 'transformation' come from many disparate and ideologically differing quarters; the solutions proposed are varied, often fragmentary and inconsistent. There are demands that substantive and even 'popular' justice replace, or at least modify, 'technical' and 'procedural' justice, that the elevation of 'private' rights and 'private' interests give way to social planning, public welfare and concern for non-individual matters such as town planning, preservation of the environment, and protective or affirmative discrimination in favour of the disadvantaged. Even now, there are widespread demands for the further extension of abstract formal and individual rights—against the state and its agencies, against the family and the school.

The processes and aims of law-making are increasingly the subject of debate and attack. This volume presents some distinguished contributions to that debate; and its focus allows clear and practical consideration of the implications of law-making in one society and its culture and heritage.
