The Cambridge Philosophical Society was founded in 1819 for the purpose of promoting scientific enquiries and of communicating the results. The Fellows of the Society met regularly to read and discuss papers.

In 1844, Volume 1 of the *Proceedings* was published. In 1923, a separate journal was started, the *Biological Reviews*, and thereafter the scope of the *Proceedings* was restricted to mathematical and physical sciences. For several years now, although the title *Proceedings of the Cambridge Philosophical Society* suggests a journal of general science, it has contained only papers on pure and applied mathematics.

The Council of the Cambridge Philosophical Society has therefore decided, whilst retaining the numbering of the volumes, to insert the word Mathematical into the title, starting with Volume 77 in January 1975. The publication in each year of two volumes of the existing size will continue, a volume consisting of three parts issued at two-monthly intervals.

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
