
INFORMATION FOR CONTRIBUTORS TO ISSUE. Contributions are welcome. Manuscripts should be typed double-spaced with ample margins for editorial marking. Two paper copies should be submitted along with a computer disc (WordPerfect 5.0 or 5.1 or Microsoft Word 5.0 or 5.1 are preferred). Contributors submitting pieces from Africa are exempted from the requirement to submit them on disks. Footnotes, if present, should be placed at the end of the piece and the number referring to them should be typed flat in the text, not superscripted. Use of footnoting software packages makes program translations difficult, please avoid them. The editor asks contributors to note that in *ISSUE*, terms are italicized, not placed in quotes. Manuscripts should be consistent with the recommendations of *A Manual of Style* (University of Chicago Press, 14th edition, revised).
