Exhibitions

The Embassy of Mexico and London presented an exhibition of water color paintings by Ignacio Barrios at the Gallery of Canning House during March-April 1974.

An exhibit of pre-Columbian gold from the Museo Del Oro, Bogotá, was shown at the Center for Inter-American Relations Gallery, New York, April 24–July 28, 1974. A grant from the National Endowment for the Arts was received by the Center for the exhibit which will be on tour for two years in the United States under the auspices of the American Federation of the Arts, co-sponsors of the exhibition. El Dorado: The Gold of Ancient Colombia, was selected by Julie Jones, Associate Curator of the Museum of Primitive Art and included 200 pieces from the collection of the Museum, which is directed by Luis Barriaga del Diestro and is part of the Banco de la República, de Bogotá. A comprehensive catalogue is in preparation in both soft and hard cover editions.

Latin American Research Review

The Kresge Art Center of Michigan State University presented an exhibition of Mexican Ceramics, organized by Irwin Whitaker, November 18–December 16, 1973. The exhibition included over 100 items collected by Professor Whitaker. The Whitaker Collection attempts to present a cross section of current works from Mexico, a country with a continuous and remarkable ceramic past.

Iberoamerican Celebration

Drake University presented a unique art exhibit featuring works by Latin American and Spanish artists. As part of the Iberoamerican Celebration, Javier Calderón, the Bolivian classical guitarist, spoke on the guitar world and trends n Spanish guitar music of today and presented a concert of works by Spanish and Spanish American composers. Research Grants

The National Science Foundation and the Agency for International Development offered grants to U.S. scientists and engineers interested in applying their experience to problems of development in AID-assisted nations. Both research/training grants and pure research grants covering travel are available. The first type entails an institutional affiliation and usually a duration of nine-twelve months, while the second covers travel and lasts nine months. Applicants must have at least five years postdoctoral teaching experience and be affiliated with academic institutions in the United States.
