



All contributions (2 copies unless submitting by e-mail attachment, see below) should be typed on A4 (or equivalent) paper and double spaced. Any form of annotation and referencing may be used for the original submission, but accepted papers must be revised to conform to *Utilitas* house style. A copy of the style sheet is available from the editor on request. Typescripts will not be returned. Authors are responsible for observing the laws of copyright when quoting or reproducing material, and for any reproduction fees involved. Authors submitting a paper do so on the understanding that, if accepted for publication, exclusive copyright in the paper shall be assigned to the publishers. In consideration for assignment of copyright, the publisher will supply the author with two free copies of the journal. Notwithstanding the assignment of copyright in their contribution, all contributors retain certain non-transferable rights, provided appropriate acknowledgement is made to *Utilitas* as the original place of publication.
