Puritanism has received much of the blame for the evils of twentieth-century America. But the Puritan immigrants came to New England principally to participate in a viable form of government and had no thought of the future impact of their social ethics. Using rich and varied sources, Mr. Foster perceptively examines the rules of behavior the settlers thought they should follow as members of a civil community, and shows that—despite its many ambiguities and paradoxes—Puritanism in New England was a coherent and truly new way of life.



The American Society of Church History announces the publication of a cumulative Index to volumes 31 through 39 (1962-1970) of Church History. The new Index supplements an earlier one compiled by Mr. Holley M. Shepherd which covered series I and II of the Society's Papers and the first thirty volumes of Church History from 1932 through 1961.

Compiled by Kent Druyvesteyn, former assistant to the editors of *Church History*, the new publication is a comprehensive guide to three regular features of the journal: articles, book reviews, and dissertation abstracts.
