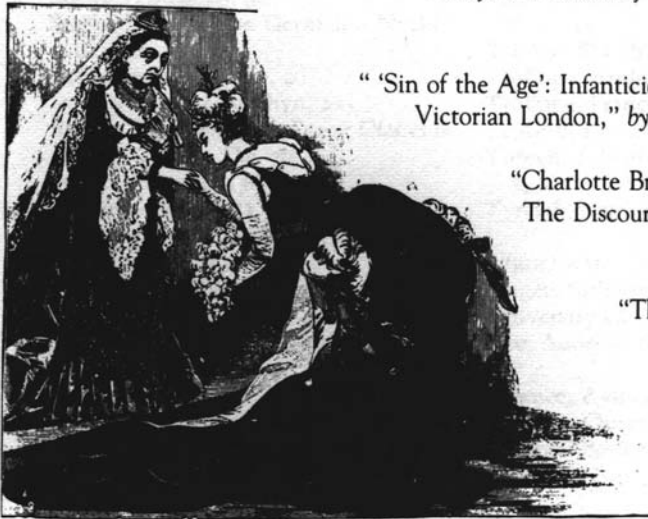

In 1913 Sotheby's auctioned the vast collection of books, manuscripts, proofs, furniture, and other possessions that had once been owned by Robert and Elizabeth Barrett Browning and their son Pen. After years of patient research, Philip Kelley and Betty A. Coley have produced a list of nearly 7,000 items from the Browning household (including their private library), and half of these have been traced to their present owners. After Elizabeth's death in their Florentine apartment on 29 June 1861, Robert Browning commissioned the above painting, *Drawing Room at Casa Guidi*, by George Mignaty. Since the painting (now in the Goewey Collection of Mills College Library) provides a remarkably detailed record of the room's appearance in 1861, it is one of the chief sources of evidence being used by the Browning Institute, which owns Casa Guidi, in plans for restoration. Today the Browning rooms are open once more to the public, and by joining the Browning Institute you can contribute to the restoration of Casa Guidi as a museum and study center.
