National Accounts of the USSR in the Seven Year Plan Period

Abraham S. Becker

Dr. Becker, a Senior Economist at the RAND Corporation, is here concerned with the pattern of change in Soviet national income and product in the years 1958-1964, which he develops through analysis of a set of national accounts constructed independently from official Soviet national income data. Representing a continuation of the work heretofore associated with Abram Bergson, the book is unique in this or any other Western series in presenting ex ante accounts for the target year of the Seven Year Plan, 1965. Western estimates for these years contain no counterpart of Dr. Becker's growth measurements by deflation and only intermittent exploration of the structure of resource use, a focal theme in this study. For a significant transitional period in Soviet affairs, this volume offers the only published national income and product accounts.
