In this issue, there are 5 original articles; Jan Chianese and Brian Channon present the first article. The authors describe the rationale and process by which a new and different model of clinical teaching, learning and assessment has been developed to support pre registration degree students in becoming recognised competent practitioners in radiography. For those individuals who are involved or interested in risk management, Ola Holmberg and Brendan McClean present a very detailed analysis of the incidents originating in the treatment preparation chain and evaluate these in terms of near misses and actual incidents.

In the article presented by Warren Kilby, there is much discussion and some interesting conclusions made regarding the significance of cell survival parameters for the use of equivalent uniform dose in tumour dose evaluation.

Vincent Wu and his colleagues present their study on the evaluation of the user-friendliness and dosimetric accuracy of treatment planning systems for 3-dimensional conformal radiotherapy.

The article presented by Jan Verstraete and D. Huyskens, highlights the value of completing appropriate QA forms to register procedural errors in a radiotherapy department in an attempt to improve the overall quality assurance process.
