J. A. WILLIAMSON

This broad survey of the outline of history, written for the general reader, covers in 760 pages a remarkably wide field. Beginning with the emergence of human life on the earth, Mr Revill traces the development of man from the first flowering of civilization in Egypt, Sumeria, and the Indus valley to the post-war world of our time. Politics provides the unifying theme of this long and complicated story; but attention is given to social, cultural, and economic developments.

Medieval Religious Houses: England and Wales

DAVID KNOWLES and NEVILLE HADCOCK

This book contains the first catalogue that has ever been printed of *all* the religious establishments of England and Wales in medieval times. It originated in the lists compiled by Dom David Knowles in his *Religious Houses of Medieval England* and includes, besides numerous additions and corrections, the lists of the houses of the Military Orders, Colleges and Hospitals, many of which are the outcome of the researches undertaken by Mr Neville Hadcock while preparing his map of Monastic Britain for the Ordnance Survey. The whole book gives an impressive picture of the vast religious organization of medieval England, with its monasteries, friaries, colleges and hospitals, and will be an indispensable work of reference for historians, anti-quaries and all who are interested in any way in medieval studies.
