Book reviews

Tsuga forresti. Eight flowers of the genus Primula, nine species of the genus Rhododendron, and four Magnolias are illustrated.

Pride of place in the book is given to the Chinese dove tree Davidia involucrata, being one of the very few species accorded the highest of three grades of legal protection under the 'Regulations for the Protection of Wild Plant Reserves of the People's Republic of China'. In all, 354 Chinese plant species are accorded one of three grades of protection, 42 of them being found in western Sichuan. The photographs are captioned in English with scientific names. The brief text is in English, Chinese and Tibetan.

Red Data Book of the People's Republic of Bulgaria: Volume 2, Animals

These two rather splendid volumes are in the tradition of the 20 or so *Red Data Books* produced in the Soviet Union (where they cover not only the whole country and most of the republics, but also smaller administrative units such as

Yakutia and north-east Siberia and the Murmansk region).

Although written in Bulgarian, it is possible to enjoy the books with the aid of the illustrations and maps, symbols and scientific names, plus, of course, the tightly packed two-page English summaries in each part.

Among the 763 higher plants listed, no fewer than 124 are endemic to Bulgaria. Of the 763, 31 are already extinct in Bulgaria, 158 are endangered, and 574 are considered rare.

About 20 vertebrate zoologists have contributed to Volume 2; there are accounts of 24 fishes, 14 herptiles, 100 birds and 19 mammals. Thus, there are 157 vertebrate species in Bulgaria that are either extinct already as breeders or are held to be 'threatened' or 'rare'. The locations of 56 present or proposed protected areas are plotted on a map.

It is good to see in colour a variety of Balkan flowers and, among the animals, the rarely photographed eastern spadefoot toad, leopard snake, demoiselle crane and long-legged buzzard.
