PROCEEDINGS OF THE SOCIETY FOR THE PROMOTION OF HELLENIC STUDIES 2022-2023

The Annual General Meeting of the Society was held at 2pm on Saturday 17 June 2023 in Room G22/26, Senate House, Malet Street, London. The President, Professor Paul Cartledge, was in the chair and welcomed members. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved. Professor Cartledge delivered his report on the activities of the year as follows.

The year began with the Green Lectures in September. Dr Victoria Sabetai, Academy of Athens, delivered two lectures, *Looking beyond Athens: Life and Death in Ancient Boeotia* and *Weddings in Ancient Athens: a journey through images, pots and findspots*, travelling from London to Southampton, Newcastle, Liverpool and back to London in a little over a week. We are indebted to Professor J.R. (Dick) Green for his generous sponsorship of this Lecture series. In February, Dr Ashley Clements visited from Trinity College Dublin and delivered a lecture at the Hellenic Centre, Paddington Street, London, on *Humans, among other Classical animals: Classics and anthropology in the Anthropocene*.

We also held a number of joint events. In January, we joined with the British Institute at Ankara and Roman Society to remember Gina Coulthard, who had worked on all three of the Society's publications for many years, the *Journal of Hellenic Studies, Archaeological Reports* and *ARGO*. Dr Stephen Hill and Professor Stephen Mitchell delivered tributes to Ms Coulthard, and Dr Jane Rempel delivered the Gina Coulthard Memorial Lecture: 'Sinope in a Black Sea World'. In March, we joined with the Roman Society, when we held a panel discussion on the Antikythera Mechanism, with a suite of lectures by Dr Jo Marchant, Professor Mike Edmunds and Dr Seb Falk, chaired by Professor Liba Taub.

We have also held a number of visits: to the Fitzwilliam Museum, Cambridge for a guided tour of *Islanders: the Making of the Mediterranean* led by the principal curator Dr Anastasia Christophilopoulou; to the Ashmolean Museum, Oxford for a guided tour of *Labyrinth: Knossos, Myth and Reality* with the curator Dr Andrew Shapland; and to see the Bassai sculptures at the British Museum guided by Dr Alexia Petsalis-Diomidis, Dr Thomas Kiely (BM's AG Leventis Cyprus curator), Ms Lesley Fitton and Professor Tom Harrison (BM's Keeper of Greek & Roman Antiquities).

Professor Cartledge thanked Professor Mike Trapp (the Hon. Librarian), Ms Joanna Ashe and the team of Librarians as ever, for all their sterling work for the Library during the last year. He noted that a number of events in aid of the Library fundraising campaign had been held, including with Natalie Haynes who spoke about her new novel, *Stone Blind*; A.E. (Alicia) Stallings, Oxford Professor of Poetry-elect, who spoke about her new collection, *This Afterlife: Selected Poems*, including some of her poems about the ICS; and a handling workshop: *Greek and Roman antiquities handling workshop: recording, illustrating, 3D modelling*.

Professor Cartledge explained that, due to the unexpected tragic death of our copyeditor, Gina Coulthard, the *JHS* and *AR* have been published with some regrettable delays this year and were despatched to members in March 2023. Two further editions of *ARGO* have been published during the year, and we are very grateful to a generous grant from the Leventis Foundation which will allow us to distribute free copies of *ARGO* for up to one hundred schools. He thanked all the Editors: Professor Lin Foxhall, Dr Jan Haywood, Professor Laurence Totelin (*JHS*), Dr Yannis Galanakis and Dr Tulsi Parikh (*AR*), and Dr Daisy Dunn (ARGO).

Professor Cartledge also thanked the Council members who had served as Trustees over the last three years: Professor Katherine Harloe, Professor Polly Low, Dr Christine Plastow, Professor Michael Squire, Professor Rosalind Thomas and Professor Phiroze Vasunia. He also thanked the retiring Membership Officer, Dr Stephen Harrison, for all his efforts.

Professor Cartledge ended by looking forward to future plans. The academic year will start with an event at the National Museum of Scotland in Edinburgh jointly with the Roman Society and the Classical Connections Network: this will showcase talks on Classical collections in local museums and include a guided tour of the NMS collection. Details of this and next year's programme will be mailed to members over the summer.

The Hon. Treasurer, Mr Peter Lennon, was unable to attend the AGM. Professor Cartledge reported that last year there was an overall deficit of £150,000. This was due to a combination of factors: losses on the investment portfolio (due to the war in Ukraine, inflation, rising interest rates); a decline in publishing income from CUP (unfortunately part of an ongoing trend); a slight decline in membership subscriptions; and higher costs for the Library. On the other hand, we were pleased to have income in donations of £14,000. Mr Lemos proposed the adoption of the 2022 financial statements; Dr Mountford seconded; and the motion passed *nem. con*.

Professor Cartledge introduced the proposal to raise subscriptions.

He noted that, while it was usual practice to raise the subscriptions every three years, due to the covid pandemic the last raise had been four years ago in 2019. Professor Van Steen proposed and Dr Hauser seconded the motion which was passed *nem. con*.

The motion was seconded by Dr Thomas. Dr Emily Hauser proposed and Ms Fitton seconded the following as Honorary Members: Dr François Hartog, Professor Christel Müller, Professor Nota Kourou, Professor Reinhard Senff, and Professor Sir Geoffrey Lloyd. Professor Van Steen proposed, and Mr Lemos seconded, Buzzacott LLP for re-election as auditors for 2023. All the motions passed *nem. con*.
