2021 APA Winter Prize Winners

APA/PDC Prize for Excellence and Innovation in Philosophy Programs

Jointly sponsored by the APA and the PDC since 1999.

Winner: The National High School Ethics Bowl (NHSEB)

The National High School Ethics Bowl (NHSEB) promotes respectful, supportive, and nationwide discussion of ethics among high school students.

Book Prize

Awarded in odd years for the best published book that was written by a younger scholar during the previous two years.

Winner: C. Thi Nguyen (University of Utah)

Games: Agency As Art offers a comprehensive account and analysis of how playing games involves a project of developing ourselves as agents.

Arthur Danto/American Society for Aesthetics Prize

Awarded to a member of the APA and the ASA for the best paper in the field of aesthetics, broadly understood.

Winner: Sarah E. Lewis (Harvard University)

Sarah Lewis's paper, "Groundwork: Race and Aesthetics in the era of Stand Your Ground Law," reflects on the concept of "grounding" as it considers a range of works of art that address racialized life in the US.

Dewey Lectures

Given by a prominent and senior (typically retired) American philosopher who is invited to reflect, broadly and in an autobiographical spirit, on philosophy in America.

Eastern: Christine M. Korsgaard (Harvard University)
Central: Allan Gibbard (University of Michigan, Ann Arbor)
Pacific: Margaret Gilbert (University of California, Irvine)

Essay Prize in Latin American Thought

Awarded to the author of the best unpublished, English-language, philosophical essay in Latin American thought.

Winner: Ernesto Rosen Velasquez (University of Dayton)

The essay, "Is Latina Mestizo Identity a Being-in-Worlds?" puts Mariana Ortega's Latina feminist phenomenology in conversation with Afro-Caribbean philosopher Frantz Fanon.

Joseph B. Gittler Award

Given for an outstanding scholarly contribution in the field of the philosophy of one or more of the social sciences.

Winner: Anna Alexandrova (University of Cambridge)

Anna Alexandrova's book, A *Philosophy for the Science of Well-Being*, constitutes an extremely significant contribution to the philosophy of social science in delineating the philosophical and conceptual foundation of the contemporary science of well-being.

Gregory Kavka/University of California Irvine Prize in Political Philosophy

Awarded to the author of a paper in a refereed journal, an original book chapter or an original essay published in a collection with a multiplicity of contributors, from any area of political philosophy and political theory.

Winner: Chong-Ming Lim (Stanford University)

Lim's paper fills a philosophical gap on the conversation over timely, connected political issues of free political speech and controversial political monuments.

Routledge, Taylor & Francis Prize

Recognizes the scholarly work of adjunct professors.

Winners: James Fritz (Virginia Commonwealth University) Junyeol Kim (Chungbuk National University)

James Fritz's article, "Moral encroachment and reasons of the wrong kind," poses a challenge for defenders of moral encroachment theories about knowledge: how are moral considerations reasons? Junyeol Kim's article, "The Horizontal in Frege's Begriffsschrift," offers an original interpretation of Frege's horizontal stroke in his mature work.

Prize for Excellence in Philosophy Teaching

Recognizes a philosophy teacher who has had a profound impact on the student learning of philosophy in undergraduate and/or pre-college settings.

Winner: Monica Janzen (Anoka-Ramsey Community College)

Monica "Mo" Janzen's research focuses on the scholarship of teaching and learning (SOTL). She utilizes civic engagement projects as a method of community-based learning in her ethics classes.

Frank Chapman Sharp Memorial Prize

Awarded to the best unpublished essay or monograph on the philosophy of war and peace submitted for the competition.

Winner: Lee-Ann Chae (Temple University)

Lee-Ann Chae's paper, "What is the Aim of a Just War?" highlights critical problems with just war theory, and clarifies the task ahead.
