Three copies of each manuscript should be submitted, and each manuscript should be accompanied by a statement of the approximate number of words that it contains. A submission fee of \$15.00 is required from nonmembers of The Economic History Association. Prospective contributors may obtain from the Editorial Office a copy of "Suggestions to Contributors," a list of the major literary and stylistic customs of the JOURNAL.
