### THE CONTRIBUTORS

Hans Speier is chief of the Social Science Division of the Rand Corporation. His recent publications include German Radio Propaganda, with Ernst Kris, et al. (1944), and Social Order and the Risks of War: Papers in Political Sociology (1952).
