### THE CONTRIBUTORS

WILLIAM T. R. Fox at various times between 1943 and 1951 was Research Associate and Assistant Director of the Yale Institute of International Studies, and served as Managing Editor of World Politics during its first five years of publication. He is now Professor of International Relations and Director of the Institute of War and Peace Studies at Columbia University.

HOWARD R. SWEARER is Assistant Professor of Political Science at the University of California, Los Angeles. In recent years he has published a number of articles on Soviet domestic affairs and is at present making a study of local governmental and party affairs in the USSR.

AMITAI ETZIONI is Associate Professor in the Department of Sociology and a staff member of the Institute of War and Peace Studies at Columbia University. His most recent publications are *The Hard Way to Peace* (1962) and *A Comparative Analysis of Complex Organizations* (1961).

ROBERT I. ROTBERG teaches African history at Harvard University and is also a research associate of Harvard's Center for International Affairs. Having completed A History of Tropical Africa, to be published in the spring of 1963, he is working on a full-length study of "The Roots of Nationalism in East and Central Africa."

CHARLES WINDLE, until recently a member of the George Washington University Human Resources Research Office, is now with the Special Operations Research Office of the American University, where his chief interest lies in developing programs of human factors research for Army problems.

THEODORE R. VALLANCE, former Deputy Director of the Human Resources Research Office, is now Director of the Special Operations Research Office of the American University in Washington, D.C. He has taught social psychology at the University of Massachusetts and Miami University.

Manfred Halpern, Associate Professor of Politics in the Program of Near Eastern Studies at Princeton University, is also a consultant to The RAND Corporation and the Department of State. His book on *The Politics of Social Change in the Middle East and North Africa* will appear in the summer of 1963.

A. J. R. Groom, a former student at the University of London and Lehigh University, is now doing graduate work at the Institut Universitaire de Hautes Etudes Internationales in Geneva, where he is preparing a study of British thinking in regard to nuclear weapons.

HAROLD STEIN, Professor of Public and International Affairs at Princeton University, is Research Director of the Twentieth Century Fund's Study of Civil-Military Relations. He is the co-author, with Walter Millis and Harvey C. Mansfield, of *Arms and the State* (1960) and both co-author and editor of *Civil-Military Decisions* (in press).

THOMAS PERRY THORNTON, a member of the staff of the Chief of Naval Operations, was Visiting Research Associate of the Center of International Studies at Princeton University during 1961-1962. With C. E. Black, he is serving as co-editor of a forth-coming symposium on international communism and political revolution.

KLAUS EPSTEIN, Associate Professor of History at Brown University, is the author of Erzberger and the Dilemma of German Democracy (1959). He is currently engaged in a study of the history of German conservatism from Möser to Hegel.
