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WILLIAM O. BROWN, 1899-1969

Professor William O. Brown, former Director of the African Studies Program at Boston University and a former President of the African Studies Association, died on February 1, 1969. He would have been 70 on October 18th of this year. Bill Brown made a substantial and lasting contribution to African Studies in this country by establishing a center for teaching and research on Africa which became a model and source of teachers for others that followed. He performed many services for the A.S.A. and other groups dealing with Africa. But probably those who knew him well will most remember his kindly and helpful nature. He had close and cordial relations with colleagues and students, as a result of great personal concern and generous allotment of his time to their needs.

MEMORIAL LECTURE HONORS PROFESSOR BROWN

The general aura of the evening is summed up in an excerpt from the program: "By those who knew him, William O. Brown will be remembered as a pioneer in the field of African Studies and as a man of warmth and humor who gave himself with a rare sense of dignity, modesty, and human compassion."
