PRINTED AT THE UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON PRINTING PLANT

CONTRIBUTORS are asked to observe the following procedure:

- 1. The manuscript should be double-spaced, including footnotes, which should appear together at the end of the manuscript.
- 2. Footnotes should give the full publication data for works cited; author and title should appear in the original language with the proper diacritical marks whether in the Cyrillic or Roman alphabet. For example:
 - ⁷ В. О. Ключевский, *История сословий в России* (3rd ed.; Petrograd, 1918), р. 48.
- 3. Names and terms from languages written in Cyrillic appearing in the text, however, should be transliterated according to the Library of Congress system.
- 4. The contributor's exact title and university or other affiliation should appear on the manuscript.

PUBLICATION DATES

Beginning with the December issue, the new dates of publication will be December 1, March 1, June 1, and September 1.
