Organ Transplantation

A conference on "Legal and Ethical Issues Surrounding Organ Transplantation," cosponsored by the American College of Legal Medicine, the American Society of Law and Medicine, and the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute, was held in Arlington, Va., April 18-20, 1985.

Among the issues discussed were selection of recipients and donors, resource allocation, organ procurement, reimbursement decisions, informed consent, the role of state health departments and institutions, and medical determination of death. A special session of the conference focused on the effect of new federal legislation on organ transplantation policy.

Environmental Ethics and the Solar System

The Center for Continuing Education of the University of Georgia conducted a conference on "Environmental Ethics and the Solar System" June 5-8, 1985 in Athens, Georgia. The conference was co-sponsored by the Planetary Society and the journal *Environmental Ethics*, with a grant from the Ethics and Values in Science and Technology (EVIST) Program of the National Science Foundation.
