The essays in this volume deal with the relevance of moral philosophy to substantive issues facing individuals or groups in practical life. Some of the papers focus on particular problems such as the nature of physical death, genetic engineering and nuclear war. Others are concerned with more formal or general features of practical thought such as the validity of abstractions and the importance of the individual. The volume is addressed to students of philosophy and to a wider readership of those who are personally or professionally involved in social and political issues of this kind and who wish to address at a serious, effective level the moral dimension of these issues.
