MAGHRIBI STUDIES

The American Institue of Maghribi Studies (AIMS) announces its first Short—Term Grants Program, covering the summer and fall of 1986. The Institute has a \$15,000 fund available for research support in 1986 and will entertain immediate applications. Small grants will be made for research in the Maghrib with primary reference to Tunisia.
