the various adaptations and specialisations and gives a short account of what is known of their history. Distribution throughout the British Isles is given on a county by county basis.

The conservation of widely distributed species is always difficult and although the release of young birds, which have been bred from parents initially taken into captivity because they were injured, has helped, it is not a long-term solution: habitat protection is the only answer. The book is well produced with a coloured frontispiece, 31 excellent black-and-white photographs and a sprinkling of fine line drawings by Ian Willis. The text is supplemented with numerous diagrams, tables, charts and maps. I have no hesitation in thoroughly recommending this excellent monograph.

These two publications include interesting papers on various aspects of tropical deforestation. Blowing in the Wind looks at the environmental consquences of forest destruction whereas Where Have All the Flowers Gone? considers in addition the social implications. Both books provide detailed examples showing that we are not coming to terms with the nature or extent of the problems. In a paper discussing Indonesia's environmental management, Robert Goodland points out that natural resources 'require a longer term management strategy than conventional economics provides' in order to allow sustainable utilisation. Little is being learnt from the life-styles

of forest dwellers who do utilise and trade in forest products in a sustainable way as heavy-handed exploitation continues relentlessly.

Although the series of which these publications form part is addressed 'both to laymen and scholars' these books will be more useful as reference works than for general readership.
