Introduction

The present report covers the period of three years from 1 January 1967 to 31 December 1969. It follows closely the pattern as set by previous reports, especially that for the years 1964–1966, formally approved by the XIIIth General Assembly and published in volume XIIIB of the *Transactions of the IAU*.

The period under report includes the first eight months of the year 1967 (until 31 August) which fell under the responsibility of the former Executive Committee, but it does not include the first seven and a half months of the year 1970 still within the responsibility of the present Executive Committee.

Decisions of the Executive Committee related to the XIIIth General Assembly and printed in *Transactions* volume XIIIB or published in the *Information Bulletin of the IAU* will not be repeated here. Thus, the present report is actually restricted to formal matters and deals with facts necessary for permanent record. The reports on the activity of IAU Commissions, Inter-Union Commissions, Astronomical Services, etc., have been included in the *Reports of Astronomy*, 1970, to be published as volume XIVA of the *Transactions*.

The Activities Report deals with the administration of the Union, meetings of the Executive Committee, IAU Membership, adherence of countries, Commissions of the IAU, colloquia and symposia organized by the IAU, IAU publications, and relations to other organizations.

The Report on IAU Finances gives a rounded off picture of the receipts and payments of the Union during the period under report, and presents an outline of the financial problems the Union has to face.

The Report as a whole is supplemented by an appendix listing data on Adhering Organizations, IAU Members and IAU Publications.

Activities Report

The President of the Union summoned, with the authority of the Executive Committee, an Extraordinary General Assembly which was held in Prague, Czechoslovakia, on 15 May 1968. This Extraordinary General Assembly modified articles 4a and 11a of the Statutes of the International Astronomical Union in that it added to the six existing categories of adherence, categories 7 and 8 with 20 and 30 units of contribution respectively. The proceedings of this Extraordinary General Assembly have been published in *Information Bulletin* No. 20.

Administration

The Executive Committee and the officers responsible for the administration of the Union have had to deal with an ever increasing number of problems arising from the natural growth of the IAU, its complex relationship with other organizations and from the rapid progress in astronomy. The organization of symposia and colloquia, and the preparation of IAU publications, have now permanently become the responsibility of the Assistant General Secretary. Another development of apparently institutional character is the meetings of executive officers (President, General Secretary and Assistant General Secretary), regularly held at least twice a year in order to co-ordinate the Union's activities in its manifold fields of interest.

The administrative office in Prague had to be re-inforced by a short-hand typist over the periods of intensified work, especially from 1 September 1969 on. Moreover, the President, the General Secretary and the Assistant General Secretary benefited from the services of several assistants and secretarial help in Hamburg, Prague and Utrecht, generously provided by their respective home institutions. It is hoped that the financial situation of the Union will permit one of the future General Secretaries to assemble an IAU staff large enough to cope with the administration of the Union without external help.

Meetings of the Executive Committee

The Executive Committee, in its former composition, held the 29th meeting in Prague during the thirteenth General Assembly, having had sessions on 20, 21, 27 and 29 August 1967. The meeting was presided over by the President of the Union Prof. P. Swings. All members and both counsellors were present.

The 30th meeting of the Executive Committee in its present composition, was held in Prague on 31 August 1967 under the presidency of Prof. O. Heckmann. All members and both advisers were present. Further, the Executive Committee held the following meetings:

The 31st meeting in Hamburg-Bergedorf from 26 to 30 August 1968. Excused were: Prof. A. B. Severny, Vice-President, and Prof. P. Swings, adviser.

The 32nd meeting in Frascati (Rome) from 21 to 26 September 1969, when all members and both advisers were present.

The Executive Committee formed, at its 31st meeting, a Statutes Committee to prepare a revised version of the IAU Statutes and By-laws. This committee, which consisted of the President Prof. O. Heckmann, the Vice-President Prof. M. Schwarzschild, the General Secretary Dr L. Perek, the adviser Prof. J.-C. Pecker, the former General Secretary of long standing Dr D. H. Sadler, and the

Executive Secretary Dr A. Jappel, met in Frankfurt a/M in December 1968 and worked out a draft of the revised Statutes and By-laws for submission to the Executive Committee. The approved draft has been published in *Information Bulletin* No. 23.

Between meetings of the Executive Committee, the business of the Union was, where necessary, conducted by correspondence between members and advisers.

Adhering Countries

Lebanon withdrew from the Union in 1967, and Colombia has adhered to it since that year. The 32nd meeting of the Executive Committee admitted Iran to the Union from 1969 on. Cuba has applied for admission, and its application will be submitted to either the 33rd meeting of the Executive Committee or the XIVth General Assembly, according to whether the present or revised Statutes and By-laws will be in force at the time of submission.

The list of Adhering Countries and corresponding Adhering Organizations, together with the approximative number of individual Members in each country, is given in the appendix on pages 25–26.

Members of the IAU

The number of IAU Members was 1572 on 1 January 1967. A further 450 new Members have been admitted at the XIIIth General Assembly since then. On the other hand, the General Secretary has been informed of the decease of 29 Members, so that the Union had 1993 Members on 28 February 1970.

The list of Members whose decease has been notified since 1 January 1967 is given in the appendix on page 26.

Commissions of the IAU

The Transactions of the IAU, volume XIVA, subtitled Reports of Astronomy 1970, include the reports prepared by the Presidents of each of the 38 Commissions of the Union, assisted by their Vice-Presidents, Organizing Committees, those responsible for the various working groups or committees formed within the Commissions, and by the Commissions themselves.

The Executive Committee approved, at its 31st meeting, to change the title of Commission No. 5 from Commission for Abstracts and Bibliography to Commission for Documentation; in French from Commission des Analyses de Travaux et de Bibliographie to Commission de Documentation.

In the period under report, Commissions have co-opted a number of new members from among the Members of the Union. On the other hand, Members of the IAU complied with the wish of the Executive Committee not to adhere to more than three Commissions, and resigned their membership in Commissions in excess of three.

Prof. A. I. Lebedinskij has been succeeded by Prof. A. A. Mihajlov, nominated as Vice-President of Commission No. 17 on the Moon.

The Presidents of Commissions will prepare proposals for the new composition of Commissions including co-opted members and new IAU Members to be admitted at the General Assembly.

The Executive Committee formed, at its 32nd meeting, a Working Group on Numerical Data in Astronomy and Astrophysics with the following membership: Prof. Ch. Moore-Sitterly (Chairman), Prof. C. W. Allen, Prof. M. Migeotte, Prof. W. Fricke.

The purpose of the Working Group is to deal with problems of collecting and disseminating numerical data in astronomy and astrophysics, prepare a programme of procedure, act as intermediary between the IAU and CODATA, and prepare a meeting of interested Members at the XIVth General Assembly.

The IAU was, in addition, represented at numerous symposia and meetings of many ICSU Organizations, as announced in the IAU Information Bulletin.

IAU Publications

Budgetary considerations and the fact that the Union cannot afford facilities of a publishing house prompted the Executive Committee radically to reformulate the publication policy of the IAU. Thus it was resolved that

-The old contract with Academic Press and Willmer Brothers should be terminated.

-A new publisher should be found.

- -The Union should only finance the production of such publications as are meant for free distribution to Members.
- -The distribution of IAU publications on a subscription basis should be discontinued.
- -Only institutions of developing countries should obtain IAU publications free of charge.
- -All symposium proceedings should be published for the account and risk of the publisher.
- -For such publications, the publisher should pay the Union a royalty.
- -Such royalties should primarily be used for purchasing the volumes to be given free of charge to institutions of developing countries.

These principles were embodied in the contract made with D. Reidel Publishing Company, Dordrecht, Holland.

Transactions of the IAU

The Transactions of the XIIIth General Assembly were published in two volumes, A and B. Volume A included the corrected Draft Reports, distributed free to Members of the Union. Volume B, subtitled Proceedings of the Thirteenth General Assembly, Prague 1967 was distributed free of charge to those who were Members of the IAU at the time of the thirteenth General Assembly.

The Invited Discourses, Joint Discussions and the results of Special Meetings held during the XIIIth General Assembly were published in the form of a symposium volume under the title Highlights of Astronomy as presented at the XIIIth General Assembly of the IAU 1967.

The Draft Reports and Transactions volumes were financed from the budget of the Union. The *Highlights of Astronomy* already went to the charge of D. Reidel.

IAU Information Bulletin

The IAU Information Bulletin was prepared and edited by the General Secretary, and printed, published and distributed by D. Reidel. It appeared, as a rule, twice a year and went, free of charge, to IAU Members and institutions on a special distribution list.

Publication Policy

The Executive Committee examined in detail several proposals for lower publication costs with a view of obtaining lower selling prices. Unfortunately, all possibilities examined proved impracticable, and thus it was resolved not to change the present arrangements, which are as follows: —The Draft Reports have been abolished.

- -The Reports of Commissions will be published in *Transactions* volume A, to be distributed free of charge to Members at the General Assembly. The production costs of this volume are the responsibility of the Union.
- -The Proceedings of the General Assembly will be published in *Transactions* volume B, to be distributed free to those having been Members of the IAU at the time of the General Assembly. Production costs to be borne by the Union.
- ---Information Bulletin of the IAU to be financed by the Union.
- -All other IAU publications to be financed by the publisher, on his account and risk, but the Union to obtain a royalty of 5 % of the selling price. Free distribution only to the Organizing Committee of the Symposium in question and to Institutions of developing countries on a special distribution list.
- -Information Bulletin financed by the IAU and distributed free of charge to IAU Members and selected institutions.

The financial aspects of this publication policy are commented on in the Report on the Financial Situation.

Relations to other Organizations

IAU Representation

1. International Council of Scientific Unions. The General Secretary represented the Union at the seventh meeting of the ICSU Executive Committee in Rome (October 1967). At the twelfth General Assembly of ICSU held in Paris, in September 1968, the General Secretary was elected Vice-President of ICSU for two years. The General Secretary also represented the Union at the meeting of the ICSU Executive Committee held in Yerevan, in October 1969.

The General Secretary is the present representative of the Union on the Executive Committee of ICSU.

2. *ICSU Organizations*. The Union participates in the activity of a number of Special and Scientific Committees, and Inter-Union Commissions formed and sponsored by ICSU. For more details please see pages 13 onwards of volume XIIC of the *Transactions*.

Direct Relations with UNESCO

The IAU had the benefit of three direct contracts with UNESCO, which provided for grants to the International Summer Schools for Young Astronomers, jointly organized in 1967, 1968 and 1969. These summer schools proved a great success, and the Executive Committee wishes to express to UNESCO its heartfelt thanks for its generous financial help.

The 1967 grant of \$ 8 000 according to contract UNESCO/NS/0134/67 was paid to the Organizers of the Summer School in Manchester direct, and is not included in the accounts of the Union.

The two other grants, each of \$ 8 000, towards the summer schools in Arcetri (1968) and Hyderabad (1969) respectively are included in the financial report.

Moreover, the Union obtained from UNESCO a grant of \$2 000 towards the studies of Mr. B. De of India at the University of Michigan. This grant was paid directly to Mr. De.

Relations with ICSU

Over the period under report, the Union enjoyed the most understanding support of ICSU in all its efforts. In addition to the annual UNESCO subvention, transmitted to the Union by ICSU, this organism paid the Union, jointly with UNESCO, further \$ 5 000. A similar grant of \$ 4 000 has been made for the year 1970.

The Executive Committee feels that it has to extend its special thanks to ICSU for the generous assistance given to the Union.

Report on IAU finances

In accord with the policy adopted in 1961, the Executive Committee presents to the Members of the Union a 'Summarized Account of Receipts and Payments' covering the period from 1 January 1967 to 31 December 1969. All amounts are given in U.S. dollars converted from other currencies at the following ICSU conversion rates, treated as exact:

£ sterling: \$ 2.80 (\$ 2.40 after devaluation) U.S. = 3.60 Dutch guilders = 4.90 French francs = 14.36 Czechoslovak crowns.

The period under report was marked by the devaluation of the Pound sterling in 1967 and that of the French franc in 1969. This resulted in a total loss to the Union of \$478.69 on its English and French bank accounts. The conversion rate of = 4.90 French francs, as used throughout the summarized account, was the official ICSU rate of exchange until 1 November 1969.

Certain bank operations, such as transfers from one account to another and reimbursements, were effected at current rates of exchange and thus resulted in exchange differences.

The summarized account has been derived from 14 (one for each currency and each year) individual accounts of receipts and payments audited and certified as correct by the Union's professional accountants. These accounts will be available for examination by the Finance Committee at the XIVth General Assembly.

SUMMARIZED ACCOUNT OF RECEIPTS AND PAYMENTS

The statement on pages 12–14 is a simple account of receipts and payments collected for convenience under a few main headings. The following explanatory notes provide more detailed information on each item of the accounts.

Receipts

1. *National Subscriptions*. The XIIIth General Assembly of the IAU, held in Prague, resolved to fix the amount of the unit of contribution at 900 gold francs, the gold franc being equivalent to 0.3266 U.S. dollars. Thus, the unit of contribution is 293.94 U.S. dollars.

The modification of articles 4a and 11a of the Statutes of the 1AU, by adding to the 6 existing categories of adherence categories 7 and 8 with 20 and 30 units of contribution respectively (Extraordinary General Assembly held in Prague on 15 May 1968 – see Proceedings published in *Information Bulletin* No. 20), led two countries to adhere in category 7.

As on 31 December 1969, the IAU had 44 adhering countries paying annually a total of 184 units of contribution. Eighteen countries adhered in category 1, nine each in categories 2 and 3, three each in categories 5 an 6, and two countries adhered in category 7.

The contributions of 39 adhering countries had passed through the bank before 31 December 1969. Three further payments made in 1969 passed through the bank after 31 December 1969. One adhering country owes its dues to the Union since 1966, another one since 1965. One adhering country has already paid its contribution for 1970, and the account of another country shows a balance to its credit.

2. Sales of publications. The complexity of the accounts from the printers and publishers, and the many different arrangements for the sale of transactions and symposium volumes as well as reprints from them, make it impracticable to give separate statements for each volume and reprint sold. 3. Subscriptions to IAU publications. The system of distributing IAU publications on a subscription basis has been terminated in 1966. It is suggested to omit this heading in the budget for 1971–1973.

4. Interest on reserves in savings banks. The interest earned in 1967 on the savings accounts at the Dime Savings Bank, First National City Bank, Chemical Bank and Bowery Savings Bank were transferred to the current account of the IAU with the Chemical Bank when these savings accounts were closed. The interest on the savings account at the American Savings Bank has been allowed to accumulate on this account. The interest of \$ 582.58 earned on the savings account at the Amsterdam-Rotterdam Bank in 1969 has been transferred to the current account of the IAU with this bank.

In addition, the current accounts in Dutch guilders and French francs attracted interest in the total amount of \$ 240.33.

5. UNESCO subvention through ICSU. Detailed accounts of the expenditure of this subvention are submitted to UNESCO and ICSU each year. The distribution of the subvention is left to the discretion of the IAU within the permitted UNESCO categories.

In 1969, the normal UNESCO subvention of \$ 14 000 was increased by a combined UNESCO-ICSU grant of \$ 5 000. The amount of \$ 23 987.03 was paid erroneously by ICSU, and the excess of \$ 5 000 had to be reimbursed. \$ 12.97 are bank charges. 6. UNESCO contracts. The Union obtained two contracts from UNESCO during the period under report:

(a) Contract UNESCO/NS/0847/68 providing a grant of \$ 8 000 towards the organization of the International Summer School for Young Astronomers in Arcetri.

(b) Contract UNESCO/SC/1492/69 providing a grant of \$ 8 000 towards the organization of the International Summer School for Young Astronomers in Hyderabad.

The last payment of 2000 under the terms of contract SC/1492/69 will be made in 1970. 500 represent the balance payable under the terms of contract UNESCO/NC/3034/66 (see Agenda and Draft Reports, 1967, page xlii)

7. Other receipts. The entries under this heading largely misrepresent the actual receipts of the Union, as they include internal bank transfers, transient items, reimbursements, etc. The following is an analysis of the amounts of \$ 74 603.39, 31 136.29 and 11 788.16 for the years 1967, 1968, and 1969 respectively:

It is seen that the bulk of this sum is made up of withdrawals from the savings banks, which were used for financing the production of IAU publications, transfers from one current account to another, the ICSU loan and various reimbursements. These operations cannot be considered effective receipts, as they are balanced by corresponding payments.

Payments

The headings have been numbered to correspond to those of the budget approved by the XIIIth General Assembly in Prague, August 1967.

1. Administrative Office. The expenses of the Administrative Office include the salaries, social security and pension payments of the IAU staff, and expenses for the regular meetings of the Executive Officers of the Union. It should be noted that thanks to the generosity of the Observatoire de Nice, Astronomical Institute of the Czechoslovak Academy of Sciences, the Astronomical Institute at Utrecht, the European Southern Observatory, and the Deutsche Forschungsgemeinschaft, the Union paid no rental, had the free use of all communication facilities, and only spent a negligible amount for stationery.

2. Subscriptions to ICSU. The IAU makes an annual contribution towards the administrative expenses of ICSU of an amount equal to 2% of the income from subscriptions from Adhering Countries for the previous year.

3. *Expenses of Commissions*. The participation of the President of Commission No. 17 in the meetings of the Committee on Lunar Nomenclature and a visit of the Secretary of the International Summer School for Young Astronomers to Switzerland resulted in expenses exceeding the budgetary amount of \$ 500 by \$ 240.59.

4. Specific Projects of Commissions. Details of the allocations approved by the General Assembly are given in the report of the Finance Committee to the XIIIth General Assembly. (*Transactions IAU*, vol. XIIB, for 1967; *Transactions IAU*, vol. XIIB, for 1968 and 1969.)

Actual payments on these projects were as in the list appended. This list requires the following comments:

The grants made towards the publication of the Cartes Synoptiques represent balances from previous years and are not covered by the total sum allocated in 1967.

The sum actually charged to Commission No. 38 is \$4968.92. The difference of \$198.49 between this sum and that in the list is due to the devaluation of the French franc. It should be noted that thanks to an additional ICSU subvention of \$5000 to Commission No. 38, the Executive Committee could reduce the allocation from the original \$22000 to \$19000, so that the total amount at the disposal of that Commission for 1968–1970 is \$24000. The actual balance in favour of Commission No. 38 is therefore \$10563.39 + \$198.49 = \$10761.88, out of which \$2225 have already been committed for 1970.

The total of \$1 543.63 paid to Commission No. 27 for the publication of the Catalogue of Variable stars has not passed through the bank accounts and is therefore not included in the summary account.

The balance as on 31 December 1969 is made up of credits in favour of different projects which may, but need not be spent in 1970.

5. Expenses of the General Assembly. The amount of \$ 21 309.14, as given in the summary account, had been withdrawn from the IAU current bank accounts in connection with the XIIIth General Assembly in Prague, 1967. This sum was used as follows:

7. Meetings of the Executive Committee. The expenses arisen from the 1967 meeting in Prague are included in those for the General Assembly, heading 5, as above. Total expenditure was higher than that for the previous meetings of the Executive Committee: it has become more and more difficult to finance the administrative meetings of the IAU from sources others than its own. The expenses for the meetings of the Statutes Committee have been included in this heading, this committee having been an extension of the Executive Committee rather than one of its projects.

8. Organization of Symposia and Colloquia. The payments made were, as a rule, for travel grants towards participation in the meetings; organizational expenses were insignificant. The grants were allocated by the Organizing Committees of the meetings in cooperation with the Assistant General

14. Reimbursement of Loan from ICSU. The ICSU loan to the Union of \$ 10 000 has to be repaid as follows under the terms of contract: \$ 2 000 in 1969; \$ 3 000 in 1970; \$ 3 000 in 1971 and \$ 2 000 in 1972. Thus, the payment of \$ 4 000 covers the instalment for 1969 and two thirds of that for 1970.

15. Reimbursement to Savings Accounts. Under the budgetary provisions, \$ 38 500 had to be repaid to the IAU savings accounts until 31 December 1970. The amount actually reimbursed is \$ 38 763.89. The excess of \$ 263.89 is due to a difference between the ICSU and effective rate of exchange of the Dutch guilder. The difference between the \$ 56 564.79 withdrawn from the savings accounts and the \$ 38 763.89 repaid is \$ 17 800.90.

The reimbursement of the ICSU loan (partial) and that to the savings accounts is entered in headings 14 and 15 respectively under Payments. A transfer of \$ 5 000 from the current account at the Chemical Bank has not yet been put to the credit of the IAU current account with the ČSOB.

Explanatory Notes

Item 4, Specific projects of Commissions has been corrected for the actual balance in favour of Commission No. 38 and the UNESCO/ICSU subvention of \$ 2 000 it is to receive in 1970, as well as for a balance of \$ 1 500 due from 1967 for the publication of the *Card Catalogue of Clusters and Associations*. Item 5 of Payments (XIVth General Assembly) includes the amounts of \$ 3 000 shifted from the budget of Commission No. 38 in favour of young astronomers wishing to attend the General Assembly, and of \$ 2 000 to obtain for the same purpose from UNESCO. Item 6, IAU Publications: the sum of \$ 17 000 is made up of the estimated payment of \$ 14 000 for the production of *Transactions* volume XIVA and of that for printing the Agenda for the XIVth General Assembly, the Report of the Executive Committee, the Agenda of Commissions and *Information Bulletin* No. 24.

The Finance Committee at the XIVth General Assembly will be asked to endorse the supplementary budget for 1970, as proposed above, and to approve a comprehensive budget for the years 1971–1973.
